HOW. SLOTETIAT'S REPORT

Mr. President & Gentlemen,

It is my privilege and pleasure on behalf of the Executive Committee, to present for your consideration and adoption the 25th Annual Report, dealing with Association affairs during the 1971/72 season.

The past season has been one of further progress, and if one is permitted to look back over previous seasons, in this, our Silver Jubilee Year, one cannot help but note the remarkable growth and accomplishments of cricket and its administration in Sutherland Shire.

Twenty four clubs, forty one teams, and 747 registered members is evidence of active participation in the game of cricket in this area alone. Administration is progressive, our finances are sound, and one can look to the future with continuing assurance for the well being of this Association.

Membership

Although the total number of teams, (41) is one less than the previous season, two new clubs - Cumberland County, and Salecians - affiliated, making a total of 24 clubs, an addition of two. The total membership of 747 is 50 more than for the 1970/71 season. The drop in the total number of teams is due to some of the larger clubs having administration problems in catering for three or four teams.

Competitions

As usual, the grading of teams presented difficulties, and the Executive Committee debated for many hours before deciding on final gradings, which, upon reflection proved to be fairly satisfactory. The main dissention being nine teams in the B.2 grade, and the playing of many one day matches to ensure each team played each other twice during the season. The behaviour of the Bundeena R.S.L. team and its continued forfeiture of matches is a problem which the incoming Executive has to face, and decide whether or not the future affiliation of this club is in the best interests of cricket.

Teams were graded into five grades, A.l., A.2., B.l., B.2. and B.3., with eight teams in each grade with the exception of B.2. which had nine teams.

The introduction of daylight saving enabled longer hours of play, particularly in one day matches, and the elimination of Sunday games, to the satisfaction of the majority of members.

Finals

For the second season in succession it was decided to play finals between the two teams in each grade with the greatest number of competition points. Only two Minor Premier Teams, (Cronulla Sutherland A.1 and

Miranda R.S.L. B.l.) won their final match. The other Premier Teams being Sylvania Heights A.2., Cronulla R.S.L. B.2., and Januali B.3. Sylvania Heights Youth Club could consider itself perhaps a little unlucky in having two Minor Premier Teams defeated in the finals in B.2. and B.3. grades. To the Premiers, the Executive Committee extend heartiest congratulations. Well played!

The decision to play an extra competition round for teams not participating in finals proved to be unpopular and unsatisfactory. The Executive Committee have noted this, and certain recommendations will be put forward in an endeavour to improve the playing of finals in the future.

Details of play in the finals, and points score details appear in the Hon. Recorder's Report.

Shell Company Inter-Association Competitions.

Our teams entered in the Inter-Association Competitions met with mixed success. Each year it is the same old story with regard to our Martin Shield Team. The best players will not make themselves available for selection. This Association could field a formidable Martin Shield Team capable of winning the shield, bearing in mind the potential strength of some of our players.

The Daily Telegraph and John Durham Shield Teams again did well, particularly our Telegraph Team, finishing in equal first place with Bankstown with 67.50%. The quotient system placed Bankstown ahead by the very narrow margin of .05. In the final for the Telegraph Shield, Parramatta defeated Bankstown. In other Inter-Association Competitions, Newcastle defeated N.S.W. Catholic for the Martin Shield, and Hornsby defeated St. George in the Durham Shield final. A more comprehensive report of our Inter-Association matches has been prepared by team managers, and appears elsewhere in this report.

Congratulations to the Boys' Association in winning the Harold Moore Shield. This team had a most convincing win against Southern Districts in the final.

The Executive Committee extends its thanks to team managers, players who made themselves available for selection, scorers, umpires, and everyone else who assisted in the promotion of the Inter-Association Matches, in particular, our thanks and appreciation to the Executive

Committee of the N.S.W. Junior Cricket Union for the preparation and organisation of these matches.

Double Wicket Competition

A fresh innovation this season was the introduction of a double wicket competition conducted by the N.S.W. Junior Cricket Union. Sixteen Associations participated, and our team comprised of Rob. Rushbourne, and Grant Murphy. The day proved to be most successful with Sutherland advancing to the semi final and being defeated by Canterbury 0-7, Sutherland 2-5. In the final, Hornsby 2-23, defeated Canterbury 2-13.

Rex King Trophy

Once again the District Club proved too strong for our representative teams, winning all three matches. Our Telegraph Team recorded the best performance, and full details of these matches have been recorded by team managers. Our Congratulations to the District Club, and sincere thanks in making turf wickets available for these matches, which provides valuable experience for our players.

Vale Athol Eagles

Athol Eagles, a former Association stalwart, passed away during the season. Athol will long be remembered by older Association members, not only for his cricketing ability, but also as an administrator of the game. He was a member of the old Sutherland Shire Cricket Association 1921-36, and one of the first Life Members of the present Association. Checking through old records, Athol won the Association batting average seven times, bowling average three times, and figured in four record wicket partnerships. His best batting average was 59.2 season 1928/9, and his best bowling average 7.24 season 1934/5. In the 1927/8 season he topped the batting aggregate with 789 runs. In the 1934/5 season he collected 107 wickets, and took four wickets in four balls 1932/3. A most impressive playing record, but to many he perhaps will best be remembered as a keen, forthright and most able administrator of the game, serving for many years on the Association Executive Committee. To his widow we offer our sympathy and sincere condolences.

Life Membership

Two nominations for Life Membership of the Association have been accepted. Vince Ridge, (Sylvania Heights,) and Les. Fisher, (Jannali.) These gentlemen are currently Association Vice Presidents, and have served many years on the Executive Committee. They have represented the Association in Inter-Association Matches, and are most worthy of receiving Life Membership. Suitable presentations will be made to them at the Annual Dinner and Presentation Night.

Umpires

The Umpires Association is still struggling for sufficient members. There was a slight increase in active membership this season, and if a further increase of about six members could be attained, all competition

Subsequently Sutherland Council were prepared to purchase at some considerable cost sufficient wickets for the needs of our Association and the Boys' Association. Due to storage problems, and possible theft of the wickets we reluctantly advised Council that we were not in favour of the wickets being purchased, as we felt that we could not be held responsible for such valuable equipment.

Rex King Dinner

A Testimonial Dinner to honour Rex King's service to cricket in the Shire was promoted by the four cricketing bodies during the season. The dinner was a huge success with an attendance of approximately 120 persons. Among the guests was Association Patron, Les. Johnson, M.H.R. George Weblan, President, N.S.W. Junior Cricket Union, Tim Walker, M.L.A. as well as representatives from Sutherland Council and the St. George and Georges River Cricket Associations. The guest speaker was well known and popular cricket identity, Warren Saunders, Association President, Jack Edwards, presented a suitably inscribed watch to Rex, and a similar gift to his wife Daphne. It was a pleasure for Rex and all present at this reunion of many cricket identities, many of whom came out of obscurity for the occasion.

Annual Dinner

The Annual Dinner and Presentation Night held at Miranda R.S.L. followed the same format of previous Annual Dinners in what has now become a very successful social function. Last year was the sixth occasion the dinner has been held, and it has now become an established event on the social calendar.

Conclusion

To conclude this report, I should like to strike a personal note and pay tribute to those people who gave their time and effort in promotion of the game.

Three or four clubs did not have delegates regularly attend Council Meetings, and although I endeavoured to keep Club Secretaries informed of all relative information, (as did Monty Perry by medium of the "Bulletin",) it is in the interests of all clubs to see that their appointed delegates attend Council Meetings.

President Jack Edwards again presided in his usual forthright manner, heading a very workmanlike Executive.

Vice President Vince Ridge attended very capably to the distribution, collection, and maintenance of the matting.

Monty Perry once again gave an enormous amount of his time to his recording duties. Unfortunately he was unable to have reports published in the Sunday Telegraph and the Leader, but did have reports published in the Herald and Propellor.

Assistant Secretary, Bob Davey, a new man to the Executive, discharged his duties to the full and was ever willing to take on additional work.

To all the Executive, Club Secretaries, Delegates, Team Managers, Auditors, Umpires and Selectors, I would like to convey my thanks, and look forward to continued support during the coming season.

HOM. RECORDER'S REPORT

Mr. President and Gentlemen,

My report this year follows the same format as that of last year, as I was pleased with the response that report brought from the members of the Association.

Three Clubs dit not furnish scorebooks which made my job a little harder, and is the reason that Salecians and Bundeena R.S.L. in B2 Grade do not have any runs for and against shown.

Many Clubs still did not fill in all the required sections in the back of the book nor the wicket keepers; however the majority of Clubs did do much to help, and I am grateful for this.

- B1 Miranda R.S.L.
- B2 Cronulla R.S.L.
- B3 Jannali

Like last year, three teams who finished first in the Competition were beaten in the Final. However this year any Minor Premier team beaten in the Final will receive a trophy.

Most of the Individual Trophy winners had poorer figures than did those of last season, however there were still some fine performances.

Andrew Cover B1 wen four trophies. Batting average and aggregate, bowling aggregate and the all-rounders trophy. Brian Quinn B2 and Robert Dalling B3 both won three trophies, Batting average and aggregate and the All-Rounder.

A total of 18 Centuries were scored - three in A1 and A2, and four in each of the other three Grades. Andrew Cover, Cumberland B1 made two unbeaten 'tuns' - 123 not out and 101 not out. Miranda Rangers A2 batsman Allan Griffiths also scored two centuries; 138 and 124 and both against Caringbah De Ia Salle.

Ten Hat-tricks were captured, 1 in A1 none in A2, and three in each of the other three Grades.

Andrew Cover scored the most runs in the season - 708, and had the most points of the All Rounders. Allan Griffiths had the highest score - 138.

Peter Gains, Sylvania Heights Youth B2, captured the greatest number of wickets - 71. The most wickets taken in an innings was by Stephen Mahoney, Miranda R.S.L. B3 - 9 for 46.

I thank those captains and secretaries who phoned in match results so prompt ly, and the Umpires! Association for its contributions to the Bulletin under the nom de plume of Arbitrator, which caused so much interest and discussion throughout the season.

SUTHERLAND SHIRE CRICKET UMPIRES ASS'N

The umpires of the local association congratulate all the competition winners, including the minor premiers who played so well during the season but just couldn't click in the finals. From all reports from our colleagues, those finals were as tense as Test Matches and kept all umpires on their toes. With the large number of interested spectators one could almost imagine oneself out in the middle of the Sydney Cricket Ground. It all adds up to an enjoyable experience that makes this game of cricket a challenge for life,

Midway during the season our President Ron Ellis had a hard decision to make. Through his personality and personal effort the umpires association was gaining both in respect from players and other kindred associations and also in strength of numbers. His love of the game made him venture, after an injury during a match, into the realms of umpiring where he put the same zest and devotion as he had put into playing cricket. He had to decide between a very big promotion which meant a transfer to Victoria or giving up this wonderful opportunity and staying here where he had made so many friends and where on three or four nights a week, all day Saturday and an occasional Sunday, and all through the Christmas holidays, he could live and breathe umpiring. Those close to him knew what a struggle it was for him to make the right decision. Ron will be hard to replace.

To those who have decided for various reasons, mostly old age, to hang up their boots, we say: don't hang up those boots - change your creams for dark trousers, blue tie, white coat and white hat: you will Perhaps you remember the times when you had to act as never regret it. an umpire when no official umpire was available and you were all tensed up and worried in case you gave the wrong decision and one team took You were worried about exception to it and started to cause a scene. what you would do if this happened and so your decision was a twisted one. Some players acting as umpires react by leaning towards the opposition when making their decisions, whilst others over react and lean towards their own players. Towards the end of the season some cricketers are so confused that they hate to be called upon to act as an umpire. Well, when you become an umpire you are taught the rules, given a few matches with an experienced umpire and you have a completely different attitude. You are not concerned with the outcome of the match or individual trophies. Soon you are able to give clear and unbiased decisions and your mates who played with you and against you in previous years respect you and your decisions.
