### To all Members of the Sutherland Shire Cricket Association Boys' Competition

Ladies and Gentlemen,

May I again present on behalf of your committee the Thirteenth Annual Report and Hon. Treasurer's Financial Statement for the year ended 30/4/69.

It is cordially submitted for your approval and adoption.

#### SUMMARY OF THE SEASON

Cricket in general received an uplift with the tour of the West Indies, prominence in television and an improvement in Fress coverage. Although the N.S.W. Sheffield Shield toan performed well below par, the success of the much underated Australian side should prove an inspiration to the budding youngsters and enthusiasts.

Locally, your 'Association had another successful season free of any major upsets, in fact the Disputes and Protests Committee were not called upon once and every club fulfilled their obligations. Your Representative teams performed creditably, competing in two finals and shared with the senior body the honour of winning the 'James Searle Shield', virtually a turf wicket club championship.

Delegates' meetings were well attended and most clubs through their own officials gave the Association every support in both administrative and playing roles.

#### TEAMS

A further decline in teams, namely, 87 with 1160 registered players, was a decrease from 1957/85 of 8 teams and 148 players. Most Associations have suffered similar trends and there are many reasons for this problem, but basically it revolves around a shortage of willing officials to organise and manage teams. There are many big licensed clubs who could, no doubt, enter and sponsor teams, as well as leading youth organisations in the Shire, but to date have failed to do so. Other areas such as Heathcote, Sutherland, Woolooware, Menai and Kurnell, are devoid of organised teams of boy cricketers and these areas must be explored. It was only a few years ago, that this Association had 115 teams and almost 1600 players. The Shire population is increasing (6 percent last year), so the drift needs to be halted now.

Gymea Bay were the only club to add an extra team to their ranks, but a welcome addition to us was two teams from St. John Boscoc Convent, Engadine, and our congratulations go to them, with special mention to Sister Jeanette. Mr. Whitman and others who helped. We hope they will remain with us for many years to come. Despite abundant finance, Kirrawee did not re-enter, a sad happening for this once prominent club, while St. Joseph's Convent, Caringbah R.S.L. and Taren Point did not enter, mainly due to lack of parent ornanisation.

Your Association will appreciate anyone willing to form teams next season and will give them every assistance. We will be looking to the senior body for encouragement amongst their ranks as well.

#### GROUNDS AND WICKETS

One of the driest winters on record saw most grounds in poor shape when our season commenced and following on this pattern, the summer was also very dry. It was only in the latter stages that grounds started to resemble reasonable playing surfaces, and we trust the heavy winter programme of continuous play will leave them in good order next September.

It is distressing to note that further cricket fields were lost, three on Waratan Fark, and although another wicket was laid at Shell Point, due to a misunderstanding over top dressing, we did not use it. Anzac Oval, Engadine, was withdrawn during the season due to bad condition, and

we have only used this ground for six months in three years, and we have cause for complaint here. Gawley North, Corea Road, Januali Oval and Miranda Park were all in poor condition, the first two were partly withdrawn for top dressing, as were Caringbah North and Scyalla Bay.

A survey taken will show, that in spite of local press publicity, there are LESS FULL SIZE playing fields to-day than there were some years ago. The men players are gradually being squeezed out and we should vigorously take the point with Council that small fields in restricted bousing areas are useless, but open parkland with full sized boundaries is URGENTLY needed.

We must thank Shire Engineer Bill Wood, Councillor Kevin Skinner, Chairman of Parks and Playgrounds, and Eugene Morris for their valued guidance and assistance.

#### MATTING

A major item in expenditure, the rapid wear on new matting and continued matting repairs, constitutes a problem. The front foot rule has not helped our troubles and your Association will be supporting the Senior Association in endeavouring to have this rule eliminated from concrete wicket cricket due to the excessive wear on mats, Careless handling of mats is also adding to the financial burden, and causing complaints amongst clubs.

#### FINANCE

With less playing fee income, and the increased cost of trophies and representative equipment, including caps, it was not possible to decrease playing fees from the \$2 per team. However, your Association was able to donate \$450 to the Men's Association toward their matting, as well as their reimbursement of \$50 from the printing of the Annual Fixture Book.

With an unusually large crop of injuries, it is always desirable to have some funds available for a "rainy day" and an adequate balance to commence a new season, as playing fees do not come in until mid-September.

The Association also provides free acore books for every team.

#### COMPETITIONS

Although no play-offs were necessary, most competitions were closely contested, with several only being decided in the final round of eleven matches. Wide margins were in evidence in only the 14C and 10A divisions, one point separated the winners of the 14B, 12B, and 10C, two points in 14D and 4 in the 16A, 14A, and 12A. The nett result is a compliment to the Grading Committee, with two exceptions that are always difficult to forecast, namely Sylvania in the 14C and the elevation of St. Patrick's, in the 16A.

The 16 division was unfortunate, for the first time since its inception in 1952/63 season, it was not possible to form a B division, only three teams justified B grade and, as it is not possible to conduct a competition with three teams, only one division resulted. It is to the great credit of the three No. 2 teams, namely St. Patrick's, Caringbah Sports and Caringbah De La Salle, that they fulfilled their obligations and stuck at their task. This attitude is to be highly commended.

#### CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP

The Sylvania Club, runners up in 67/68, were the winners of the "Laurie Pender B.P. Januali Trophy" with 118.6 points, and had a 9-point margin over Woronora R.S.L., with the consistent Januali on 107.2 third. Sylvania showed a consistent all round ecort while Woronora with only two teams were always prominent. Our congratulations to Sylvania. Points were: Sylvania 118.6; Woronora R.S.L. 109; Januali 107.2; Cronulla R.S.L. 100; Caringbah Sports 96; Engadine 92.3; Miranda 86.8; Gymea 83.9; Caringbah De La Salle 89.4; St. Patrick's 67.5; Como 67; St. John Boscoe 37.6; Sutherland Gray's Point 33.3.

#### PREMIERSHIPS

Sylvania Heights Youth Club with three titles, namely 16A, 14C and 10C(2), headed the poll for the second successive season, and other divisions were won as follows: 14A Caringbah Sports; 14B Engadine, 14D

Miranda Magpies; 12A Januali; 12B Caringbah De La Salle; 12C Como; 12D Caringbah Sports (2); 16A Woronora R.S.L.; 16B Engadine.

To the Premiers we extend our congratulations, to the remaining teams, thank you for your efforts.

#### REGISTRAR'S REPORT

The 1968/69 Season yielded a drop in both teams and players. The standard of cricket was, hover, excellent, as could be seen in the results of the Representative Fixtures. There were 13 clubs with a total of 1160 boys registered, comprising 87 teams. Club totals were as follows:—

The season was good with most competitions being closely contested. Boys did not take heed of the remarks of the Registrar of last year, and nearly missed out on a game of cricket. Register early next year and prevent some teams from being over-loaded.

A few Clubs were a little lax in producing birth certificates. The time will come when a player, having played three games in one grade produces his birth certificate, only to find he is an over-aged player and causes that team to lose all points. This applies only to those boys registering for the first time.

#### CRICKETER OF THE YEAR

Phillip Hart, of the Sylvania Club, was selected as your "Cricketer of the Year" and will hold the John Woodhouse Memorial Trophy.

Phillip has been a prominent member of the Sylvania Club for many years and a leading performer, particularly as an opening bowler, possessing plenty of "fire". He has also proved his worth on many occasions as a hard hitting middle order batsman and a good all round fieldsman. Phillip represented in the C. S. Walson Shield fixtures, taking Is wickets, and in his 16A Division broke the Association record by capturing 66 wickets at 7.25. He also scored 358 runs at 32.55 and captained his team to Premiership honours.

A very keen all-round athlete, we congratulate Phillip on winning this coveted honour.

#### SPECIAL MENTION

Your committee thoroughly discussed many candidates, and the margins between several were very close, making the selection one of the most difficult since the inception of the award. Greg Davies, Gymea, for splendid consistency over several seasons, especially with a weaker club, sound representative effort and dedication to the Association; Mark Ray, Caringbah De La Salle, captain of the Watson Shield, with another sound all round effort; John Dyson, Januall; and Peter Doherty, both leading run getters and promising batsmen, and Phillip Girdier. Caringbah Sports, all receive high commendation and the Association's congratulations.

#### BEST PERFORMANCE 14A GRADE

The Sutherland District Cricket Club's annual award goes to Martin Gillam, from Caringbah Sports a very dedicated cricketer and an all rounder that has improved considerably.

Martin's slow bowling was a feature in the Moore Shield fixtures, he captured 29 wickets, and in his 14A Division took 44 wickets at 10.65 and scored 259 runs, avg. 28.4. His batting is very correct and when he puts more power in his strokes, many runs should come his way. Our congratulations are extended to Martin.

#### BEST PERFORMANCE 12A GRADE

The committee, after much deliberation, narrowed this award down to three players, Paul Price, Sylvania: Keith Dyson, Januali: and Garry Pattinson. Miranda: all three very capable young cricketers with little between them in all round ability. Keith Dyson emerged as the winner, and he will hold the Sutherland United Services Club Trophy. Keith is a busy little cricketer, good strokemaker, 581 runs at 48.6, capital field and slow spinner; 24 wickets at 8.91. His two fighting centuries when his team was hard pressed toward the close of the competition were fine efforts. Both Garry and Paul are to be highly commended.

#### BEST PERFORMANCE 10A GRADE

A new award, the Len Gillam Trophy, donated by Patron Arthur Bombell, now covers our 19A Division, and Terry Humphries from the Woronora R.S.L. Clob, will have the honour of being its first victor. Terry shows tons of promise with all round ability in the Division and in the Representative fixtures, and has a fine grasp of the game for one so young. Terry's efforts in the Division were 384 runs at 27 and 72 wickets at 4.23.

#### "ON WITH THE PLAY"

Due to ground shortages, playing time is limited and this is all the more justification for matches to proceed without undue delay. The rate of overs from several teams, particularly in the A Grade of the 16 and 14 divisions, leaves a lot to be desired. Self styled pace bowlers with run ups far in excess of their speed, continuous alterations in field placing and relays of the ball back to them are time wasters. Add to this a slow field and over use of a broom by umpires, which doesn't give batsmen much chance to score attractively. Sound cricket tactics are good but gamesmanship, including the above, and delays in padding up and mid-wicket conferences SHOULD BE LEFT IN THE DRESSING ROOM.

#### CAUSE FOR CONCERN

Your Executive Committee has cause for concern over parent interference in Representative fixtures, particularly over decisions taken by Team Managers. The Association has always stressed that the managers are in sole control off the field and the captain on the field. The manager is responsible to the Association Executive only,

Your Executive realises that over the years managers have made incorrect decisions and appreciates constructive criticism, but in the vicinity of the field of play just prior to or during a fixture is hardly the occasion to question a manager's decision. Many boys are naturally servous or tense in Representative fixtures, and a careless argument could upset the whole team balance and have a depressing bearing on the game.

Selectors and managers should likewise observe that any discussion on the merits of the individual players should be made only amongst themselves or to Executive officials.

#### LIFE MEMBERSHIP

This coveted honour was conferred upon your Senior Vice-President Gordon Thomson and Secretary Mort Edson, for their services to the Association over a number of consecutive years' administration.

Nominations from the Executive Committee were unenimously supported by Delegates' Council.

Life Membership Badges were presented at the Annual Dinner and during the Annual Cabaret both officials and their wives received gifts of stainless steel carving sets, which were presented by Jim Daly, Association President, as a token of appreciation.

Bill has proved a good worker for sport in the Shire with the Caringbah De La Salle College.

Fred Malbon's penchant for statistics has served him admirably in his duties as Recorder over a period of four seasons. This task is painstaking and constant and Fred's accuracy and efforts have never let us down. I must repeat that I have seen none better than Fred in this role, He is also to be complimented upon his compilation of the difficult draw of fixtures and the allocation of grounds to suit the complicated pattern of staggered playing times.

Jack Rutty, who has championed our cause so well with the local Press as Publicity Officer over the past three seasons, also took over the role of Registrar from "Snow" Davies. Jack has proved a good toller for your Association with consistent efforts few realize the work involved. As well as local publicity Jack got our results in the Sunday Telegraph — a welcome addition. In this regard he did not receive the desired support or encouragement from some clubs. No doubt Irene, his good wife, has been an invaluable deputy and is to be sincerely thanked for her efforts.

Jack Edwards (Miranda), Lance Ray (Caringbah De La Salle), and Gordon Anderson (Sylvania) were the Club representatives to Executive. Each of these officers have proved capable administrators for cricket over several years, Jack was the President of the S.S.C.A., where he has been a familiar figure over a lengthy period and was a Cawsey Shield Selector as well as a Delegate to the District Club and Junior Union Delegate. You will agree Jack had his hands full.

Lance Ray served as a selector in the Watson Shield and on the Grading Committee, while Gordon Anderson was also the most energetic secretary of the Sylvania Youth Cricket Club, a role he has successfully accomplished over several seasons.

Due to the dual role of Jack Rutty, Les Piper was admitted to the Executive and this was a wise choice. Les in its initial season worked willingly in many capacities, Delegate to the S.S.C.A., Umpires delegate, Official Umpire and Secretary of the Januali Club. We hope Les will again stand for selection at to-night's meeting, as men of his calibre are too few in sport.

#### DELEGATES' COUNCIL

Fifteen council meetings were in the main well attended, four clubs being present at all meetings, namely Januali. Caringbah De La Salle. Miranda and St. Patrick's.

In reverse, Como and Sutherland-Gray's Point missed six and five respectively. With an allowance of two delegates per club, attendande roll resulted: Jannall 28, Caringbah De La Salle and Woronora R.S.L. 26, Miranda 25, Caringbah Sports 23, Cronulla R.S.L. 20, St. Patricks 19, Sylvania 17, Engadine and Gymea 16, St. John Boscoe 14, Como and Sutherland-Gray's Point 11.

It was the pleasing duty of the Chairman to welcome ladies as delegates from the St. John Boscoe Convent, and Mrs. J. Wittman and F. O. Dea were made most welcome.

#### UMPIRES

The decline in membership of the Umpires' Association is alarming and worrying to all officials in both Associations and the Umpires' Executive.

A specially convened meeting by the Senior Association, and comprising C. Johnson, V. Dwyer and K. Hodge (Umpires), J. Edwards (Chairman), R. King, K. Murphy and D. Collis (S.S.C.A.), and J. Daly, G. Thomson and M. Edson, discussed all aspects of the many problems associated with the matter.

It is hoped to arrest the decline next season by an all out effort by all bodies and the senior playing members to encourage membership.

Your Association makes the point of urging all club officials to take advantage of the Umpires' offer of attending their coaching classes and lectures given readily and free at times convenient to us and to those officials who are still active to renew their membership if they have not already done so and to assist in the once a year Representative fixtures, even if it is only for one match. The cadet umpires scheme is also worthy of continuance.

Our thanks are extended to the Umpires' Executive for their assistance and to those who officiated by appointment in the Representative Fixtures. They again maintained a high standard.

#### MISTAKES OCCUR, BUT -

The advantages of those Club officials who umpire in matches in attending umpires' lectures are mentioned elsewhere in this report.

There have been many instances of glaring incorrect decisions in which players have suffered, and there have been others of genuinely honest errors, which must be accepted in all sport.

However, there also have been occasions when obvious cheating is in evidence and from people who should know better. Good cricketers will reach the top if they have the ability, and they don't require false decisions to bolster their averages. A boy likes to think he won a trophy or helped win a match by his own ability.

#### CRICKET SOLIDARITY

The President of the S.D.C.C. Mr. Bryan Hazell, called a special meeting of the three cricket bodies during April, primarily with the object of discussing ways and means of advancing the "Cricket Image" in our Shire, with the three associations combining their ideas.

Messrs, J. A. Daly, N. Davies and M. Edson represented your Association in conjunction with B. C. Hazell (Chairman). J. Smythe and R. Neill, of the S.D.C.C., and R. King and K. Murphy, S.S.C.A.

The meeting was an outstanding success, with the views of the various bodies formulating many suggestions. Subjects discussed were the possibility of appointing a cricket 'co-ordinator', coaching, grounds, improved facilities, a "Cricket Club", school cricket, umpires, and the advancement of players to the District Club.

It is anticipated that meetings such as this will become a regular feature of the seasons ahead.

#### RECORDER'S REPORT

Centuries. 22 centuries were recorded during the season with 18A batsmen scoring 8, 12A, 5; 12B, 4; 14B, 2; and the 12C, 10A and 10B I each. Most successful batsmen were B. Handley (Gymea 12B) with 3 centuries, and K. Dyson (Jánnali 12A) 2 centuries.

Hat Tricks. 25 hat tricks were taken by bowlers with the 10B bowlers taking 6, 12D, 4; 10A 2; 14B, 14D, 12C and 10C, 2; and the 16; 14A; 12A and 12B one each. The most successful bowlers were G. White, St. Patricks 12D2; G. Fletcher, of Caringbah Sports 12D2; and R. Hardwin, Sylvania 10B, with 2 hat tricks each. Miranda and Sylvania bowlers took 4 hat tricks each.

Catches. These were fairly well recorded and several teams took over 70 catches, with Sylvania 10B taking 89 and Gymea 12B taking 85. Sylvania teams were to the forefront in catching and took the honours. Their U/16's took 76; 14A 57; 14C 72; 12A 51; 10B 89; 10C2 52 catches, while their 12B took 33 and 10C1 22, lowering their standard a little, making a total of 462 catches for 8 teams, an average of about 58 catches per team.

Boys who were the leading catchers are R. Harwin, Sylvania 10B, 20; B. Handley, Gymea 12B, 20; and A. Facey, Woronora R.S.L. 14B, 18 catches.

Score Books. In the older age groups, the score books were well kept, but in the younger groups, particularly the Under 16's, clubs should endeavour to educate their scorers prior to the commencement of the season. This is an important aspect of the game, as a disputed score could lead to a loss of points which the boys had genuinely earned.

Quite a few scorers recorded "No Balls as runs in the bowlets' analysis. Three clubs are to be commended on the standard of their score books. They are Caringbah Sports, who had 10 books in the final judging; Miranda Magples 6 books; and Cronulla R.S.L. 5 books.

Score Sheets. My thanks are once again to the people responsible for forwarding the score sheets so promptly. It makes a recorder's job much easier to be able to start work on the sheets on Sunday night.

Although your Association did not win one of the coveted Junior Union Shields, the series must be classed from a playing view as the most successful in its history.

Both the Moore No. 1 and Cawsey No. 2 were Divisional Winners and Finalists; the Watson Shield were undefeated and the Foster No. 1 were only one point away from being Divisional Winners. The second teams in the Moore, Cawsey & Foster, battled hard against opposition that was at times stronger than their No. 1 teams had to face.

The Rob. Allen Shield was retained with a devastating seven to all victory over St. George, while in other fixtures good wins were recorded over Georges River and Campbelltown Associations.

There will no doubt be some criticism in some sources over the selectors' there will be faults to find over managers' decisions, but the end justifies the means, and the nett result adds up to overall success. One manager summed up when he said: "To please all the players is fairly easy, to please all the parents is an impossibility". This is commun in most Junior sport, no matter what code.

Although the wisdom of entering more than one team in each series was debated by the delegates Council due mainly to expense. It is felt the overall decision was wise due mainly to the experience afforded to that many more of the lads that perhaps only just missed out in the cup sides.

Credits of the series were the sportsmanship, behaviour, dress and team spirit, on the debit side the bowling lacked variety, the opening bowlers found accurate pace difficult and the batsmen failed to take advantage of the loose ball. The most glaring fault was the running between wickets, countless runs being lost by hesitation. This possibly cost us the Arch Cawsey Shield. Coaches of all teams in the Association would do well to improve this important aspect.
